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Message from the Dean

Graduate education builds knowledge capacity and leadership skills, and is essential for Canada's future. In our environment of discovery, usually graduate students are the most creative and interdisciplinary in their approach to research questions. Over the past decade, the Government of Ontario has recognized the importance of graduate education and invested significantly in supporting enrollment expansion of our graduate programs. The University of Toronto and our Faculty have responded by increasing enrollment and will continue to do so until 2016-17. The Faculty of Medicine, with over 3,000 graduate students in health

professional master's, thesis master's and PhD programs, accounts for one-fifth of the University's graduate population.

In response to a request by the Provost, our office of Graduate and Life Sciences Education (GLSE), under the leadership of Interim Vice Dean Avrum Gotlieb, has worked with our 16 graduate unit Chairs and administrators to set enrollment targets for the next three years. The Provost will provide a financial incentive directly to Graduate Departments next year for each new PhD student enrolled that contributes to the target.

Better communication with undergraduates in the Faculty of Arts and Science is critical to the growth of our graduate programs. The GLSE office now serves undergraduate life sciences students, as well as the Faculty of Medicine's graduate students. In January, the GLSE office hosted a Faculty of Medicine graduate program information fair which drew over 500 undergraduate students. The GLSE office alerts undergraduates to graduate research opportunities through Twitter and the web, and offers advice on finding faculty supervisors.

Our Faculty aspires to provide an outstanding learning experience for every graduate student. Excellent research programs, innovative course content and effective mentoring by committed supervisors are necessary to achieve our graduate education goals. Increasingly, graduate students are attracted to a more interdisciplinary curriculum, and better opportunities to work across departments and affiliated hospital research institutes on projects will translate into improved health of individuals and populations. To critically examine our current graduate offerings and recommend new directions, a Task Force on Innovation and Transformation in Graduate Education, co-chaired by Avrum Gotlieb and Alison Buchan, Vice Dean Research and International Relations, is now underway and will report before the next academic year.

A concern among our graduate units is the limitation on competitive grant-in-aid funding from all sources necessary to support graduate student research and student stipends. Improving our success rates in grant

competitions is necessary and a major focus of our Department Chairs and Vice Dean Research and International Relations. This may not be sufficient, and new fundraising support from both local and international sources is necessary. Achievement of our campaign goals and our enrollment expansion targets is extremely important. Our Department Chairs recently raised \$1.2 million, matched by the University, in the first round of the Provost's PhD Enhancement Fund (2012-13). The Provost will contribute an additional \$900,000 for matching of new student awards funds in the next round (2013-14).

Commitment to excellence and innovation in our graduate programs is essential for our continued contribution to building Canada's knowledge capacity and our global reputation.

Best Practice in Education Rounds Session

Professors **Fiona Webster** (Department of Family and Community Medicine) and **Nancy McNaughton** (Standardized Patient Program) will be leading a Best Practice in Education Rounds (BPER) session called *Constructing the "Good" Patient: Insights for Medical Education Research from the Standpoint of Patients*. The session will take place on **April 2, 2013**.

Session Description:

Patient-centred care is a core principle at the heart of health care delivery and thus is essential to the organization of care and central to the physician-patient relationship. However, patients are not a homogenous group and there have been few studies that provide direction on how to involve them in education, research and care in a meaningful way. Much literature has focused on physician accounts of the "difficult" patient. Who then is the good patient as we construct them in medical narratives? And what are the implications of this for medical education research? This presentation will explore how the role of the patient has developed and evolved over time in clinical, education and social science literature and discuss the implications of this for future research. Professor McNaughton will draw on her extensive experience with the Standardized Patient Program and its role in medical education, and Professor Webster will draw on her research in qualitative studies with patients who experience osteoarthritic pain.
