Message from the Dean

Catharine Whiteside

Our Faculty of Medicine strategic plan is student-centered and commits to the best possible experience through institutional support, both academic and financial, and innovation that enable our students to become societal leaders of transformational change. Every student should have the opportunity to take advantage of our unique learning environment with its incredible breadth and depth of scholarship across disciplines.

The Faculty of Medicine has the largest (close to 3000) professional graduate and Masters/PhD student enrolment in health and biomedical sciences in Canada. We train ~25% of PhDs in Canada in the health and biomedical fields. Our aim is to be recognized globally for top-ranked, innovative education programs that apply leading-edge teaching and learning models. To analyze the learning needs of our graduate students in the context of implementing our strategic aims, I struck a Task Force on Innovation and Transformation in Graduate Education, co-chaired by our Vice Dean Research and International Relations, Alison Buchan and Interim Vice Dean Graduate and Life Sciences Education, Avrum Gotlieb. The Task Force has made several recommendations that will build on our strengths and address key issues in graduate education, including how we can best meet the career development needs of graduate students.

The majority of PhD students today will choose careers outside academia. Our graduate program curricula must reflect this shift, to ensure that our students have skills in communications and technology, career planning, time management, teamwork and leadership, all of which are needed in today's diverse workplaces. Based on the recommendations of the Task Force, the Faculty will develop a non-credit co-curriculum to help students learn these skills. This co-curriculum will align with existing career development activities in both the School of Graduate Studies and Faculty departments, such as departmental career workshops and alumni mentorship programs. Last year, our Faculty also struck a Task Force on Physician Scientist Education, chaired by Associate Dean Physician Scientist Training, Norman Rosenblum. This Task Force conducted an extensive literature review and environmental scan, and found that our MD/PhD Program and Clinical Investigator Programs -- the largest of their kind in Canada -- are competitive among the best in North America. However, the Task Force recommended opportunities to improve these programs. One important direction is the plan to create an Integrated Physician Scientist Training Pathway for medical students. This pathway will offer better integration of clinical practice and science, and a flexible, competency-based curriculum

customized for individual students and trainees. While our current dual-degree, parallel stream has served students well, this new model will better equip students to take advantage of the many emerging career opportunities in translational medicine, while providing the complex care that today's patients need. These and other positive changes to our physician scientist training and graduate programs will ensure we continue to deliver on our promise of improving health for people around the world through innovation in research and education.
